## Saint Germain \*dit Gautier Coorough House

Now that the Prairie du Chien Historical Society owns the “Coorough House”, the organization is writing a business plan to provide thoughtful financial goals and priorities.

Important issues that need to be addressed are:

- The building needs to be stabilized and weatherized. Over the decades bats have called it home—they need to be removed and kept out. There are places where the chinking between the logs has disintegrated leaving holes in the exterior walls.
- Period furnishing from 1840’s will be needed to bring the interior alive and “warm” up the rooms.
- The types of programs, services and activities will be offered once the structure is opened to the public need to be established.
- Fund raising.

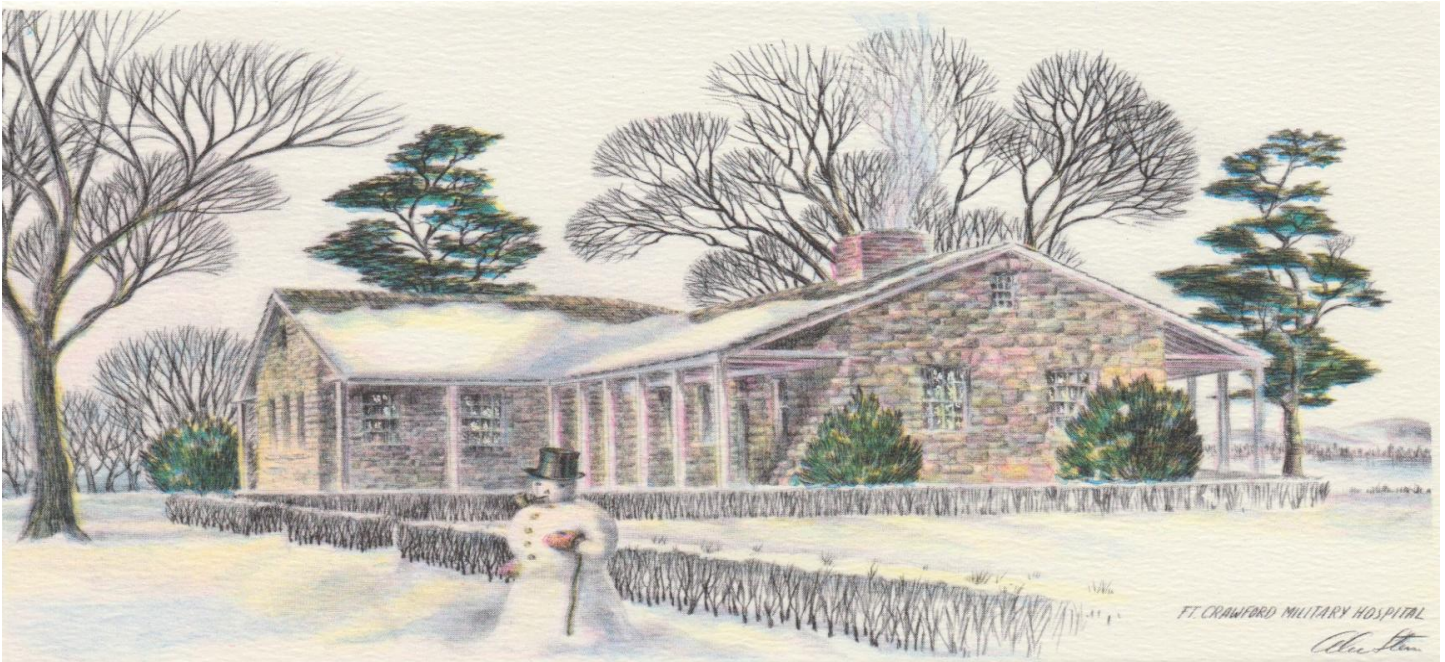

## You Just Never Know!

In the July 1, 2018 edition of the WI State Journal I read an article about a “priceless” wagon acquired for Baraboo’s Circus World Museum that awoken my memory cells blurred but cleared as I thought about it.

The article told the story of two directors of Circus World Museum, Harold Burdick and Scott O’Donnell, who had picked up a circus wagon in Onalaska for delivery to Baraboo. There it would be cleaned, restored and displayed. The circus wagon was the Beck Calliope Circus Wagon described as having “rich colors and intricate carvings and a calliope which produces sounds by sending compressed air through large whistles”. The wagon was built by Lance “Brownie” Beck in the 1940’s. Back then, Brownie travelled the area participating in fairs and parades with his wagon as his wife, Juanita Beck, played the calliope.

And now why my memory was stirred:

One sunny, beautiful autumn Friday of my freshman year at UW-Eau Claire Sue Waller (Jan Waller’s sister) and I and someone who I can’t remember decided to travel home. Without a ride we hitch hiked. We got a ride as far as Whitehall, WI (the hometown of my former boss and math teacher, Jerry Gilbertson). On the lonely outskirts of town on a very quiet portion of Highway 53 we were finally picked up by a friendly elderly man who didn’t think it was a good idea for young women to be hitchhiking. The usual conversation ensued—who are you, where are you from and where are you going. With our mention of PdC the driver said he and his wife visited there many times years ago with their circus wagon to be in parades. By chance I asked if he knew George and Emily McClure, my grandparents. Sure enough, he did. He and his wife stopped in to see them every time they were in Prairie. His name was Brownie Beck. He told me to tell my family hello.

A big dilemma—telling my family about meeting Brownie was admitting I hitch hiked. But I did tell them. It was too good of a story not to. My grandmother told me more about the Becks and she even had a record of Juanita playing the calliope. I saw the album and listened to it but I have no idea what happened to it.

Another time I hitch hiked home was that Thanksgiving. I was with a friend from Lancaster, WI. I don’t know why we did it. It was cold and snowy. Not good weather for catching rides. My memories aren’t clear but my Dad had to pick us up in LaCrosse late at night. He was not very happy about this. My Dad didn’t get upset very often with his daughters. When he did, you sat up and took notice. That was the last time I hitch hiked.

There are some lessons here:

The obvious is hitch hiking is a very poor way to travel, unreliable and stupid!

The more important one is pay attention and listen. There are stories and tales being told all the time. They are gifts from the past. I realize now that my mother and grandmother were good story tellers. I kick myself often for not being more appreciative and receptive of the gift they were offering me with their stories.
