

Happy 150th Birthday, Prairie du Chien!

Prairie du Chien became an incorporated city of Wisconsin in the year 1872. Twenty-four years after Wisconsin became the 30th state of the Union, Prairie du Chien obtained a city charter that went into effect on April 1, 1872. The first city officers were:

Mayor:	Benjamin F. Fay
Clerk:	Nicholas Smith
Treasurer:	Otto Georgii
Marshall:	R. G. Mathews

The city was subdivided into four wards. The First Ward was south of the Fort Crawford property and was called Lowertown. Many still refer to the southern portion to the city as Lowertown. The Second Ward was between Bluff Street and Rice Street. The Third Ward was the area north of Bluff Street. And the Fourth Ward was St. Feriole Island. According to the state census of 1875 the population of those wards was 2948. Men totaled 1428 and women 1520. The ethnic backgrounds of the citizens were mostly French-Canadian, German, Irish and Bohemian. There were also 29 black people living in town—21 men and 8 women. They were not included in the total population number.

In 1872 Bluff Street, now called Blackhawk Avenue, was the primary business district. Each ward had a volunteer fire department. The Prairie du Chien School District was formed and two private schools were opened for higher education. The residents of the city were kept well informed of current events by the two local newspapers, The Union and The Courier. The 1878 Historical Atlas of Wisconsin proclaimed that "Prairie du Chien enjoys considerable commercial importance, having excellent advantages of position, and is now turning attention to manufacturing interests."

Highlights of the New Exhibit

To commemorate Prairie du Chien's 150th birthday, a new exhibit was designed and installed during the off season. It is located in the Museum of Prairie du Chien. Below are pictures of the exhibit.



This bedroom set was used by the Fay Family when they resided at 203 S. Minnesota Street.

Benjamin F. Fay (1822-1920), originally from Vermont, settled in Prairie du Chien in 1853. Here, he found economic success. His endeavors included proprietor of a general store, a grain and livestock dealer, real estate agent, vice-president of the company that operated the Bridgeport Bridge, president and treasurer of the Wauzeka Manufacturing Company and on the Board of the Artesian Well Company in Prairie du Chien. In 1881 Benjamin F. and Wilhelmina Fay moved to South Street (Wacouta 203 Minnesota



Avenue). The house is a fine example of Italianate architecture and it has been on the Wisconsin Register of Historic Places since 2019.
